As a learner of another form of Gaelic closely related to Irish, I was astonished to find that, with a little effort not requiring a dictionary, I understood over 85% of the language of that song, and I do not speak Irish!

I have been learning Scottish Gaelic for a few years now and am a regular visitor to Glasgow, and the Highlands and Islands of Scotland where I have learned most Gaelic, and I am continually reminded of the close connections between Ireland and Scotland in culture, music, literature and history.

At the heart of our close cultural relationship is, of course, our Celtic languages. Scottish Gaelic is a bit like a wayward child that has gone off on its own course, but still possesses much in common with Irish.

Over the next few columns, I hope to explore some of the elements of our long standing Celtic Language kinship as we all continue on our mutual paths towards fluency.

D'fhonn an aidhm sin a bhaint amach ní mór dúinn aitheantas agus tacaíocht a thabhairt do na foilseacháin Gaeilge.

Is éasca bheith báúil leo, ach ní leor sin. Caithfimid an leisce a sháru le gníomh san gcuma is éifeachtaí, m.sh. iarrachtaí ar staidéar cuimsitheach a dhéanamh le dea-mhéin, agus gan féachaint air mar chrá croí.

In Éirinn d'fhéadfadh na stáit-seirbhísigh ins na ranna stáit, agus deascanna acu, a gcion féin a dhéanamh – ag plé le foclóireacht agus ag maoiniú as a bpócaí féin, tion-scadail chun an t-eolas atá acu ar an nGaeilge a mhéadú agus toradh a gcuid saothar a fhoilsiú ins na meáin chumarsáide! Má dhéanfaimid beart de réir ár mbriathar d'fhéadfaimís bheith chomh ráthúil céanna le muintir na h-Íoslainne a thug tosaíocht dá dteanga dhúchais féin nuair a bhriseadar laicís na Danmhairge, mar thuigeadar gurb í an teanga bunsraith na saoirse.

"Tír gan teanga, tír gan anam".

Is léir go bhfuil cearta eile daonna ann a bheadh chun ár leasa, seachas bheith ag éileamh cuairt fillte ó'n d'Tíogar Ceilteach.

Since the Celtic Club is chosen as the location for the Irish classes this year, maybe we should challenge ourselves to undertake positive things to get Irish spoken, more widely, in our midst.

To achieve this aim we must give recognition to, and support the Irish language publications. It is easy to be sympathetic to them – but that is not sufficient. We must overcome our laziness with action in the most effective way, e.g. make efforts to undertake comprehensive study, with goodwill, and not regarding it as a nuisance.

In Ireland, the civil servants in the state departments, with desks, could play their part – dealing with vocabulary and funding, from their own pockets, projects to enable them to increase their knowledge of the Irish language, and to publish the result of their efforts in the media! No need for legislation or to enact a bill.

Although it is a good thing that an Irish language Commissioner has been appointed, the solution is up to ourselves. If we do as we say we could be every bit as successful as the Icelanders, who gave priority to their own language when they broke the Danish fetters, because they (the Icelanders) understood that language is the foundation of freedom.

"A land without its language is a land without a soul".

It is clear that there are other human rights, which would be beneficial to us, besides demanding a return visit from the Celtic Tiger.

Tá Daonscoil ráthúil eile thart i Victoria agus daoine anois ag tnúth leis an Scoil Gheimhridh i Sydney i mhí Mheithimh.

Bhailigh breis is seasca duine le chéile i suíomh deas suaimhneach taobh amuigh de Bacchus Marsh ar feadh seachtaine ón 5ú – 11ú d'Eanáir.

Chuireamar fáilte roimh Gaeilgeoirí ó NSW, Qld, ACT, SA, Vic agus fiú Éire. I Mí na Nollag thug Máirtín Mac Donncha, atá ina chraoltóir le Radio na Gaeltachta i gCo Mhaigh-Eo, cuairt orainn i Melbourne. Cuireann sé clár “I gCeart lár na nDaoine” i lathair gach lá ar RnaG. Fad is a bhí sé linn rinne sé taifeadadh de na chomhráite a bhí aige le lucht na Gaeilge anseo. Le linn an Doanscoil agus é ar ais in Éirinn, labhair sé ar an nguthán le roinnt de na rannpháirthithe. ‘Sé an plean a bhí aige ná sraith cláracha fén dteideal “I gCeart lár na gCangarú” a chur amach ar Radio na Gaeltachta. Ag an am seo anuraidh ní raibh sé ach mar chaisleán san aer go mbeadh ár láithreán gréasáin féin again, ach anois tá sé i bhfeidhm againn le naoi mí anuas agus bíonn cuairteoirí againn óna Stáit Aontaithe, ó Ceanada, ó Éirinn agus ón Afraic, chomh maith le cuairteoirí ó stáit na hAstráile.

I measc na h-áiseanna ar an suíomh atá an leagan reatha agus iarleaganacha den irislitir, ‘An Fhuinneog Ghaelach’, an irislitir coicísíúil, ‘An Lúibín’, chomh maith leis an irislitir le muintir Gaeilge in Adelaide.
