Celtic Languages roundup—Cornish

News from Peter Trevorah of the Cornish group indicates a resurgence in the use of the Cornish Language. Re-elected in the recent British elections, Andrew George - Liberal Democrat MP for St Ives and Isles of Scilly become the first person to take the Oath of Allegiance in the Cornish Language on 12 May 2005.

Andrew was elected to Westminster Parliament in 1997 and gave his Maiden Speech in Cornish. He then led the Parliamentary campaign

for official recognition of the Cornish language.

This was achieved in 2002 under the 1992 European Charter for Regional and Minority Languages. Fellow Cornish MP Dan Rogerson also took the Oath in Cornish.

The Oath (An ly) in Cornish reads:

“Me a le gans Dew Ollgallojak del vedhaf len ha perthy omryans gwyr dhe hy braster an vyternes elisabet, hy Erys ha Sewyoryon, herwyth an laha. Ytho Dew re'm gweressa”

As Bearla:

I swear by Almighty God that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth, her heirs and successors, according to law. So help me God.

(Of course no good Irish politician would take this oath in Cornish, Irish or English!!)

I became Secretary of Cumann Gaeilge at my first AGM in June 2003. Although somewhat apprehensive of joining a Committee when only new to classes, I was made welcome and from my first committee meeting in August 2003, quickly became involved in preparation of the 2004 Daonscoil.

The committee meets on the first Tuesday of the month for 1 hour prior to classes, at which the treasurer updates us on finances. Correspondence, if any, is read out and responses drafted. A recurring topic for discussion is how to maintain interest in our classes, what books to purchase for our library, and arranging teachers' workshops. The Daonscoil is also an ongoing topic throughout the year as a lot of work goes into making this a success.
